News From Domestic Programs

Happy New Year to returned Peace Corps Volunteers around the world. For those of you with questions about the Office of Domestic Programs at the Peace Corps, the following article serves three purposes: 1) to introduce the new director of the Office of Domestic Programs, 2) to acquaint RPCVs with Domestic Programs' latest projects and services, and 3) to highlight the need for RPCV involvement in the Peace Corps' third goal activities.

New Leadership

In August 2002, Allene Zanger was appointed to serve as the director of the Peace Corps' Office of Domestic Programs. Prior to this appointment, she served as the director of School-Community Partnerships in the Office of the Kern County Superintendent of Schools in Bakersfield, California, where she helped school districts and community partners design and implement learning support programs. In addition, she was the program director for the Central Valley Communities for Children AmeriCorps program, which she started in 1995.

From 1993 to 1995, Zanger was an environmental education Peace Corps Volunteer in Panama. Before joining the Peace Corps, she was general counsel, vice president of public affairs, and corporate secretary for Tejon Ranch Company in Lebec, California. Previous to that, she served as a deputy attorney general in the California Attorney General's Office. Zanger earned a B.A. in political science from the University of the Pacific in Stockton, California, and a J.D. from Hastings College of the Law in San Francisco.

Peace Corps Day in February

It's not too late to sign up to participate in Peace Corps Day on February 28, 2003. Thousands of returned Volunteers

will celebrate the Peace Corps' birthday by sharing the knowledge and insights gained from their overseas experiences with their communities. As you know, part of the Peace Corps' mission is to educate Americans back home about the people with whom Volunteers have lived and worked. When you share your Peace Corps experiences, you enrich the lives of students, neighbors, and colleagues. Coverdell World Wise Schools Correspondence Match program. Educators apply to participate in the calls and are selected based on their plans to use the call in the context of their global education curriculum.

Updates From Paul D. Coverdell World Wise Schools

Teachers and those considering a career in teaching can find a treasure-trove of resources through the Peace Corps' Coverdell World Wise Schools program, among them the Correspondence Match and CyberVolunteer programs, publications on cross-cultural

issues, and the Coverdell Award for Excellence in Teaching.

Match Program. When former Peace Corps Director Paul D. Coverdell launched World Wise Schools as a domestic program in 1989, he envisioned a broad network of Peace Corps Volunteers communicating their experiences to classrooms around the United States. That vision is being kept alive today with some 5,000 Volunteers in the field e-mailing, writing, and calling classrooms in every state and the District of Columbia.

Many of you have participated in this program as Volunteers, and you can continue your involvement by wearing the shoe on the other foot as teachers, as hundreds of other RPCVs are already doing. If you work or plan to work in a classroom, consider joining the match program. Career consultants are professionals in specific fields (including RPCVs) who have agreed to answer career-related inquiries on a voluntary basis. Their fields include agriculture, environmental science, business, communications, education, and government.

RVS will begin collecting information in February for the 2003 edition, which is scheduled to be published next fall. Additionally, RVS plans to publish new online editions of two other career manuals in 2003, *Environmental Careers* and *Careers in Agriculture*.

Career Centers. In December, the RPCV Career Center at Peace Corps headquarters moved to its new location at 1525 Wilson Boulevard in Arlington, Virginia, where it shares space with the Rosslyn Recruiting Office.
